



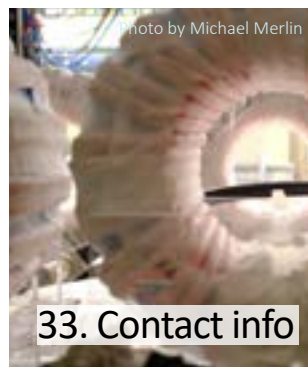
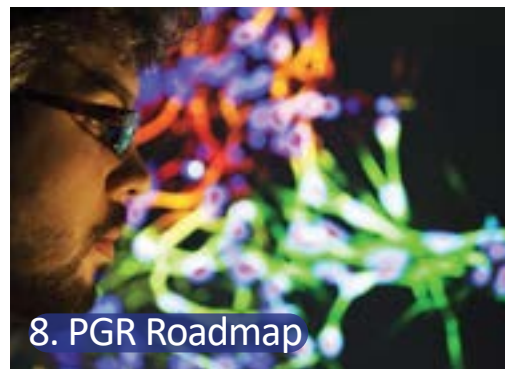
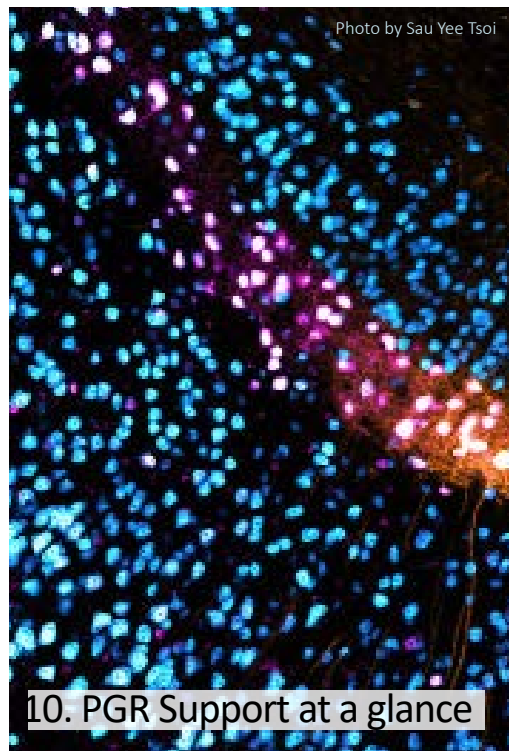

- Speak to other researchers, to share advice and recommendations about training.

PGR Roadmap

This road map is designed to help plan your own personal development. This is indicative only and you should discuss this with your supervisor.

Starting Out

Starting out is exciting, but can be daunting as there seems to be so much to do!

Consider the following

- Understand your expectations, those of your supervisor and of the institution. Look at the Code of Practice for Supervisors and Research Students, read information available through your School and College, speak to your supervisor.
- Understand the milestones– what are you working towards and make a plan. Remember to include time to relax and do activities outside your research.
- Start your networks with peers and other researchers. Find out what is available and attend relevant events.
- Take time to ensure you are confident with the basics, eg. do you know how to use the library? Do you know about reference managers?
- Breathe! Think of the first stage as a starting point in a much bigger project – you are not expected to have all the answers from day one!

Skills to focus on: Project planning and management, time management, language and writing skills, understanding ethics and integrity, Library skills – finding literature, managing references etc.

Mid-Stage

Take time to reflect, review your progress and start to look forward to life after your degree. If you are finding this period tough, try not to worry. Speak to others and identify ways to ensure you have a good work/life balance.

Some things to consider

- Review your research plan. Ensure it is still current.
- Focus on writing. Writing is hard work and requires commitment. Identify ways in which you can prioritise writing time. Experiment with different approaches to find ones which suit you.
- Reflect on the achievements you have made and how far you have come. Examine your skills, what have you developed and what do you want to develop now?
- Focus on communication skills. Find out about ways to communicate your research and build on your networking skills.
- Think about what next – do some career planning.

Skills to focus on: communication skills, networking, professional experiences, career conversations and planning

Final Stage

The end is in sight, although the writing up stage can seem to drag on! Make sure you know what is expected from you in terms of thesis formatting, submission and examination procedures and regulations.

Some things to consider

- If you are still finding it difficult to get into a regular writing habit, attend a writing retreat.
- Ensure you know the standards required for your thesis. Become an expert proof reader!
- Prepare as best you can for the viva examination.
- Continue to build a plan for your career post-degree.
- Although this can be a stressful time, do still plan for breaks and taking time out for yourself.

Research Planning and Management Workshops



Managing Your Research Project

Understand the management of research projects, covering topics such as high-level planning, prioritising, and progress monitoring.

Generative AI & the Researcher: Strategies, Insights & Practical use

This workshop aims to demystify the rapidly evolving area of generative artificial intelligence (Gen AI) tools.

Second Year PhD Skills

Focus on the skills you need as you enter the middle stages of your PhD, including starting to develop your thesis.

Working with Personal and Sensitive Data

This awareness raising workshop will introduce how to collect, share, store and protect the sensitive data you may encounter.

Archiving Your Research Data

Explore the key decisions around archiving research data, such as whether to release data under an open licence.



Research Planning and Management Workshops

Data Management for Your Research

Looks at the requirements for your research data lifecycle, data management plans, storing data securely during a research project, options for sharing or archiving data at the end of a research.

Writing a Research Data Management Plan for Your Research

This workshop will help you understand the basic components of a good Data Management Plan (DMP) and support you to produce a first draft DMP for your research project.

Final Year Focus

This session is for those approaching the end of their PhD and will look at tools and processes to help with the final year of your PhD.

7 Reasons You'll Pass Your Viva

This workshop will offer advice on ways you can prepare for the viva.

Viva Survivor (For 2nd and 3rd year PhD Students)

This workshop covers preparation for the viva, sources of support, practical strategies and discusses common viva questions.



Communication and Impact Workshops

BANish - Big Audience Nervousness

Tips and techniques to deal with nerves when presenting in front of a large audience.

Research Posters – an Engaging Graphical Research Story

What makes a good poster design? This session will equip you with the skills to create impactful and engaging conference posters.

Figures, Images and Visualising Information

Introduction to various types of visual formats including standard graphs, information visualisations and graphics for publication.

Handling Presentation Difficulties

Tips and tricks for dealing with the presentation stumbling blocks that you can't control, such as difficult questions.

Question Time - Handling Questions at a Conference Presentation

Tips and techniques when answering questions after giving a research presentation.



Communication and Impact Workshops

Navigating the Peer Review Process

Introduces researchers to the peer review system including the process, the complexities, the responsibilities of the author/ reviewer and how to get the most out of the experience.

Pitch Perfect: Public Speaking, Networking and Engaging

Techniques for presentation delivery, pitching research, networking and handling questions.

Presentation Skills for the Terrified

Tips and techniques to help conquer the fear of speaking in public.

Presenting Your Research Virtually - Best Practice for Online (and Live) Presenting

Tips for giving an effective online presentation.

Presenting Your Research with Confidence

A clear step by step structure that you can use to give a high quality presentation.

Academic Communication Skills for New Postgraduate Researchers

This session designed for first year international postgraduate research students whose first language is not English. It is intended to provide guidance to students who would like to feel more confident when communicating about their research.

Writing and Publishing Workshops



The Writing Process: Getting Started

Think about the early stages of the writing process: getting started, generating material, structuring a text and developing a first draft.

Be A Better Writer

Looks at habits, tools and strategies to convey your findings in a clear, succinct and scholarly way.

Text: Coherence, Structure and Argumentation

Improve your writing skills, sentence ordering and paragraphs, signposting, and developing arguments.

Thesis Writing Bootcamp: Planning, Finishing and Avoiding Pitfalls

Explore the practicalities of thesis writing, including planning techniques, appropriate writing style and how to make writing more productive.

Writing a Literature Review

Practical strategies for writing a literature review, including selecting source material, effective reading methods, note taking and structuring a review.

Beating Writer's Block

This workshop focuses on writer's block and strategies to overcome it.



Writing and Publishing Workshops

How to Be Your Own Best Editor

This workshop helps you to identify editorial standards for strong writing and to apply focused editorial checks to your own writing.

Critical Thinking Workshop

Identify how critical engagement with your research manifests in your reading and your writing, and how you can apply critical values to your dissertation.

Academic Writer: Creative Writer

Explores the creative writer's toolkit with short writing exercises that take us outside the realm of academic writing, and back into it.

Is My Writing 'Academic' Enough?

Explore academic conventions in terms of writing style, organisation, and linguistic and stylistic choices.

Writing Well: Language and Style

Discover key features and stylistic aspects of both academic and creative writing.

Writing Freely: Blogging About Your Research

Explore what blogging can add to your academic practice and how to use it to support your research.



Writing and Publishing Workshops

An Introduction to Copyright

Provides an overview of the fundamentals of copyright as it applies to academic researchers in terms of writing theses, journal articles and other types of research outputs.

Academic Publishing Between Copyright, Creative Commons and Open Access

This workshop is designed to explain the relationship between copyright, Creative Commons licenses and Open Access and how authors can navigate the publishing process meeting all their funder's requirements, to ensure maximum impact and visibility of their research.

Writing Your First Papers for Journals

This workshop helps PhD students acquire the skills of writing research papers for peer reviewed journals. It focuses on the critical steps involved in the writing process after the collection and analysis of data.

Writing for Publication

Advice and information on the publication process, looking at publication strategies, revising material, preparing manuscripts, targeting journals, working with editors, and the review process.

Collaborative Writing and Publishing

Explores both the benefits and potential pitfalls of writing in collaboration with others.



Public Engagement Workshops

Getting Started in Public Engagement with Research

An introduction to the ways you can engage the public with your research.

How to Design a Public or Stakeholder Engagement Process?

Strategies to design public engagement activities where everyone is engaged and comes away with something useful.

Storytelling Techniques for Effective Communication

An introduction to using storytelling techniques for effective research communication.

Voice and Presentation Skills Workshop

Explore what makes your voice interesting and sustainable when delivering a presentation.

Facilitation Skills for Public Engagement

This workshop will look at communication and inter-personal skills needed to facilitate well.

Advanced Presentation Skills Masterclass

In this practical and interactive session, you will have the opportunity to deliver a pre-prepared presentation in a relaxed and supportive environment. You'll then review it, deconstruct it and identify opportunities for improvement.

How to Create and Run a Public Engagement Event

Developing and running a public engagement event can be daunting, but done well can be a very rewarding experience. This workshop will help you to identify the who, when, where, what and why of engagement



Personal Effectiveness Workshops

Managing Your PhD Work 1: your time, your energy and your goals

Introduces different time management and goal setting models.

Managing Your PhD Work 2: working with other people 1:1 and in teams

Develop your unique team working skills by helping you to focus first on how you like to work and then how to use this knowledge to co-operate and co-work with other professional people.

Seven Secrets of a Highly Successful Research Student

Look at evidence-based key habits that will make a difference to how quickly and easily you complete your PhD. Topics include dealing with your supervisor, time management, writer's block, getting the help you need and motivating yourself.

How to Be an Effective Researcher

(For First and Second year PhD Students)

Practical ways to increase your effectiveness as a researcher, covering project planning, working practices, working with others, receiving feedback and planning for the future.

Speed Reading

This workshop provides you with the tools to help you read academic literature more quickly, strategically and critically.

Creative Problem Solving for Researchers

Explore a range of methods for problem solving, and discuss how to apply creative techniques to real problems researchers experience.



Personal Effectiveness Workshops

It's About Time...Managing Time Personal Efficiency and Effectiveness

Explore a range of methods for problem solving, and discuss how to apply creative techniques to real problems researchers experience.

Think Strategically Respond Rapidly

Focuses on responding quickly to opportunities as they arise, such as last minute conference invitations, grant announcements and journal calls.

Focus Plan Do It

This workshop looks at time management and approaches to organisation that help reduce overall stress.

Staying Well and Being Productive During Your PhD

Discusses dealing with isolation, staying motivated and keeping focussed during your PhD.

How To Work with Your Supervisors Effectively

Practical ways of working effectively with your supervisor(s) that benefit both your project and your professional development.



Personal Effectiveness Workshops

Survive and Thrive as a Part Time PhD Researcher

This session will take a questioning, coaching and supportive approach to the challenges of working part time for a doctorate.

Team Building and Leadership Fundamentals

Aims to help you understand how to be part of an effective team and enhance your leadership skills.

Introduction to Postgraduate Leadership

This workshop aims to introduce postgraduate researchers to leadership concepts and their applicability to the research context.

Conference and Event Organising

Covers topics such as planning, event structure, marketing, sponsorship, and post-event actions.

The Imposter Syndrome: Why successful people often feel like frauds

This workshop explains why high performing people often doubt their abilities and find it hard to enjoy their successes. It shows the links to perfectionism and self-handicapping strategies such as procrastination, avoidance and over commitment.

The Inner Game - Exploring Stress, Balance, Resilience and Self-Belief

Helps participants recognise and pre-emptively manage the things that stress them and look at how to manage this in a positive way.

Assertive Communication Strategies

Techniques for building self confidence in dealing with difficult situations in a clear and assertive manner.



Digital and Library Skills Workshops

Social Media for Impact: strategy, connecting & metrics

Key strategies for developing an online presence and boosting career prospects through the use of social media tools.

Copyright and Social Media

This workshop will help develop your understanding of copyright law and licensing when using works from social media (or from the internet, in general).

Finding Academic Literature

An introduction to resources and databases available to research students when searching for academic literature.

Citing Sources and Creating Bibliographies with Endnote

Advice for using Endnote to keep a database of literature sources and create reference lists for written work.

Citing Sources and Creating Bibliographies with Mendeley

Advice for using Mendeley to keep a database of literature sources and create reference lists easily in written work.

Citing Sources and Creating Bibliographies with Zotero

Advice for using Zotero to keep a database of literature sources and create reference lists easily in written work.

The Doctoral College

The Doctoral College runs an annual welcome event for new postgraduate researchers and bi-annual PGR Town hall sessions.

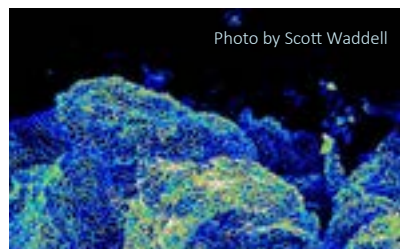

Three Minute Thesis

The Three Minute Thesis (3MT) competition is a research communication competition developed by the University of Queensland. The competition requires doctoral researchers to compete to effectively explain their research to a non-specialist audience in three minutes with one slide.

The competition enables participants to share their research and develop their presentation skills, as well as competing for a prize fund and the chance to compete in the Universitas 21 and Coimbra competitions.
